

"When all is not calm"

As I sit on our 8th-floor porch with my Bible and journal in -hand, I breathe deeply. Lord, let my soul rise up to meet you, as the day rises to meet the sun. Deep breaths. "Hoooonk." Okay, let's

try again. Breathe in deeply. "Lord. Jesus Christ, Son of Go ---" (drilling sounds from the apartment above me). Breathe.... "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a s---" (street venders blasting recorded advertisement on the sidewalk below, more honking, crying children at the children's hospital across the street).

Experiencing calmness and solitude in a Chinese city of 14 million people outside your window can be a challenge. Sometimes I think the loud noises that distract me during my morning prayers are a good representation of the challenge I have always had to quiet my soul and seek God. I have never felt like I was good at having "quiet times" or silent meditations. My brain just doesn't shut off. I start thinking about the other things that are bothering me, or the to-do list in my head. Or, I ask, "Is my heart in the right place?" The current religious situation here doesn't help with the calmness factor. It seems to be getting stricter, and some foreigners have even been asked to leave the country. It is hard to experience the calmness of Advent while the "what if's" go through my head.

I am guessing that I am not the only one who has a hard time experiencing calmness during this season. You might not be dealing with the noise of a large Chinese city, but I know that there is a lot of noise in your life. The maddening political and social noise in the United States and around the world is hard to turn down. The busyness at work and/or stresses of family life can take over. How do I experience the calmness of the coming Christchild in the midst of all the needs?

Each day I read from Shane Claiborne's *Common Prayer*. My favorite thing about reading this is the prayer "Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. As it is was in the beginning, is now, and will be forever." It is so reassuring that through all the noise, through all the pain and injustice and frustration of what is happening in the world, God's glory (and justice, and love, and peace) have been and will be forever. There have always been faithful followers standing up in the midst of it all, pointing towards the light and calmness of God's coming and being in our world.

May we be those faithful followers in this time and this place. May we seek and find him in the midst of the noise. May we remember that His coming truly does bring the calm, bright, loving light into our world and into our souls when we need it most.
