Mia Moody-Ramirez, Ph.D., is a Professor and Director of Graduate Studies in the Department of Journalism, Public Relations and New Media at Baylor, and is also Director of American Studies in the Baylor College of Arts & Sciences.

She is Vice Head of the Minorities and Communication Division and Secretary for the Commission on the Status of Women. She served on the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication Strategic Plan Implementation Committee from 2013 to 2016. She completed the Scripps Howard Academic Leadership Academy at LSU in 2014. She was the recipient of the third-annual Baylor University Diversity Award. She is a 2016-17 Academy of Teaching & Learning Baylor Fellow.

Her research emphasizes mass media representations of women, minorities and other underrepresented groups. In 2013, she co-authored *The Obamas and Mass Media: Race, Gender, Religion, and Politics.* Her journalism experience includes working as a blogger, staff writer and columnist for the *Waco Tribune-Herald*, editor and publisher of *FOR Seasons* magazine and *Elegant Woman* magazine and managing editor for Stevens Publishing.

She received her B.A. in journalism from Texas A&M University, M.A. in journalism from Baylor University, M.S. in Educational Psychology, and her Ph.D. in journalism from the University of Texas at Austin.



Building Bridges Letha Dawson Scanzoni and Friends

Letha Dawson Scanzoni changed the landscape of American evangelicalism through her groundbreaking work on the gospel-based intersection of gender and LGBTQ justice. She coauthored two of the first books that support women's



equality and LGBTQ rights with the Bible: *All We're Meant to Be* and *Is the Homosexual My Neighbor?* In all her work Scanzoni applies the liberating message of Jesus to women and to people who have been marginalized by church and society because of sexual orientation.

Building Bridges combines an exploration of the life and work of Letha Dawson Scanzoni with stories of people she continues to empower through her writing and the Evangelical & Ecumenical Women's Caucus - Christian Feminism Today, an organization she cofounded. This book illustrates her growing influence as she continues her prophetic collaboration with new generations. In addition, it provides resources for churches as they build bridges for their ministries of liberation, justice, and peace.

Kendra Weddle, PhD, is associate professor and chair of Religion and Humanities at Texas Wesleyan University, where she focuses on the intersections of gender and religion. She is coauthor (with Melanie Springer Mock) of *If Eve Only Knew* (2015), and author of *Preaching on the Plains* (2007).

Jann Aldredge -Clanton, PhD, a feminist theologian and ordained minister, serves as cochair of Equity for Women in the Church, adjunct professor at Richland College, and coleader of New Wineskins Community. Her books include *Praying with Christ-Sophia* (2007), *Seeking Wisdom* (2010), *Changing Church* (2011), and *Earth Transformed with Music* (2015).
