A conversation with Dr. Peaches Henry, President of Waco NAACP Wednesday, January 29 6:15 p.m. after supper

In response to our invitation to speak, Dr. Henry said, "I think that the most important thing we can do to promote justice in our country is to recognize that silence and inaction equal complicity. People of faith must safeguard justice for the most

vulnerable among us. This is the message that my faith compels me to share." She is in her second term as president of the Waco Branch of the NAACP. Its mission, like that of the National NAACP, is to ensure the political, educational, social, and economic equality of rights of all persons and to eliminate race-based discrimination.

A committed community volunteer, Dr. Henry has served on the executive council of Parent Teacher Associations and on campus decision-making committees from the elementary to secondary levels in Waco ISD. She has been a member of the superintendent's Advanced Academics Advisory Board. Also, she has served on Waco ISD search committees for principals and assistant superintendents. In 2017, she developed the Lean-on -Me Mondays Tutoring Program to help Waco ISD elementary and middle school students prepare for the STAAR exams. During 2018-2019, she developed the Hidden Figures STEM Project which focused on female students from the five Waco ISD middle schools to develop their interest in STEM areas.

She is a member of the Gamma Upsilon chapter of the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, an educational sorority. She is the chairwoman of the chapter's annual Commission on Civil Rights. A member of the Waco Alumnae chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, she serves as her sorority's Social Action Committee chairwoman. *cont'd on page 3*

Announcement for Tonight

Dear Lake Shore Family,

At the request of the Committee Coordinating Council, tonight's called business meeting to discuss and vote on the 2020 committee nominees has been postponed. It will be rescheduled for another date.

Transition Process Overview

Many of you are rightfully curious about what our transition process might look like. Here's an overview. As you read and think over what's here, please offer yourself and your church to God, praying for God's will to be done throughout this process.

Theological Framework: Holy Indifference

We want what God wants for our church. Nothing more. Nothing less. There's a difference between human decision making and discerning the will of God. God is in the business of constantly transforming both individuals and communities of faith.

Key question: What kind of pastor does God need us to call?

Methodological Framework: Appreciative Inquiry Organizations have to leave things behind if they are to move forward. But research tells us that people move forward with greater energy and focus if they bring some things forward from their past to their future.

Key Questions: What is right about our church and how do we build upon that? What will we leave behind?

The Role of the Transition Pastor:

The transition pastor serves as a guide or coach for the process. The Transition Team and the Pastor Search Committee make any and all decisions regarding process and candidates.

Five Parts of the Transition Process:

 Preparation: The congregation selects the Transition Team and learns about the transition model. The Transition Team organizes their work and outlines how they will lead the congregation to discern God's will for Lake Shore.
 Self-Study: The congregation engages in a self-study of its past, present, and future. This is estimated to take anywhere from 90 – 180 days.

3) Active Search: The congregation elects the Pastor Search Committee and the search begins, informed by the outcome of the Self-Study.

4) Call: The Pastor Search Committee brings a recommended candidate to the church for approval.5) Begin: The new pastor begins work in our midst.

The Self-Study portion of the process will be informed by three important congregational conversations. Each of these will likely be Saturday morning sessions so that as many people as possible can be involved.

Here are a few of the key questions for each session: Session dealing with the PAST: How did we get here? What is our congregational DNA? What are the core positives of our church? Session dealing with the PRESENT: What is the current status of our church? Where do we live? Who are our neighbors? What is our ministry context moving forward? Session dealing with the FUTURE:

What is our shared mission/vision as a church?

What kind of pastor does that imply that we should look for? The Self-Study will have two products that will inform the discernment of the Pastor Search Committee as well as potential pastoral candidates:

1) A **CONGREGATIONAL PROFILE** that accurately describes Lake Shore; its history, current reality, and future orientation.

2) A **PASTOR PROFILE** that broadly describes the type of pastor we believe God intends to lead us into the next season of life as a church.

I know you have more questions. Feel free to ask them as we move forward together.



Transition Team Nomination Announcement

The Deacons ask for your nominations for the Transition Team that will lead Lake Shore's transition process. Please prayerfully consider those individuals you believe God is calling to lead Lake Shore through these days of preparation for God's future. The nominations will be collected and reviewed by a group made up of: the Deacon Executive Committee, an At-Large Deacon, and 2 additional members of the Committee Coordinating Council. This group will be co-chaired by the Deacon Chair, Kay Avant, and the CCC Chair, Libby Bellinger.

The committee will seek to have a Transition Team that represents the breadth and depth of our congregation while also having the skills and giftedness necessary to guide the entire congregation through the transition process. You can read an overview of the transition process elsewhere in this newsletter. Among the criteria the nomination group will use will be age, gender identity, member/congregant, family status (single, parents, families with small children, "empty nesters," widowed, grandparents, etc.), leadership skills, emotional intelligence, data analysis, data reporting skills, etc. The committee will also have to contact nominees to ascertain their willingness and availability to serve. The target number for the Transition Team is seven members. The Pastor Search Committee will be elected according to the by-laws after the Self-Study is complete. Nominations will be accepted through Wednesday, February 19, 2020. Forms are available in the church office. The role of the Transition Team will be to lead the transition process in consultation with the Transition Pastor. It will plan and lead the congregational listening sessions, compile the results of the sessions, report the outcomes of the sessions, communicate regularly with the congregation, and produce the congregational profile and the pastor profile. Its role will end with the production of these two profiles. At that point the church will elect a pastor search committee to carry out the active search process for Lake Shore's next pastor.

In 2013, she launched a new initiative: Project VIER (Voter Involvement Education Registration) Coalition that brings together area organizations that are committed to social justice, including the Community Race Relations Coalition and the Women League of Voters among others. On January 7, 2020, Project VIER kicked off its latest voter registration campaign. The coalition will register voters at the county health clinics, the public libraries, local high schools and colleges, and churches.

Currently, Dr. Henry is a professor at McLennan Community College where she teaches composition and British literature. With a masters and a doctorate in English and Comparative Literature from Columbia University in New York, she is the author of articles on the poet Elizabeth Barrett Browning and the journalist Frances Power Cobbe. She has spoken at national and international conferences in San Diego, Boston, Chicago, Great Britain, Australia, and Canada. A former director of Vacation Bible School, Dr. Henry is a member of Carver Park Baptist Church where she taught Sunday School for over a decade. She is the proud mother of Corey Roberts Henry, a graduate of Waco High School and the University of Texas at Austin and currently a third year law student at St. John's Law School in New York.
