Passion of Christ

The extinguishing of lights in memory of Christ's passion is called Tenebrae (shadows) and dates back to the fourth century. The gradual extinguishing of lights is symbolic of the flight of the disciples, the approach of the enemies, and the suffering of Jesus. The total darkness recalls the days Christ was in the tomb. After the last candle has been put out, we will sit in the darkness for a moment and then depart in reflection on the death of Christ.
